


292 more workers in Europe, Africa and Asia processed "what is behind" and are now "pressing on toward

## **Projects**



#### Central Africa

**Restoration Ministry** (Reconciliation, peace-building & community development)

"A neighbor asked my husband to help him dig his garden. While he was there, terrorists came and killed him while the neighbor escaped. I had severe pain in my heart and hated the neighbor. Today, I experienced healing and peace and now I can forgive the killers and my neighbor. I still cry, but the pain is gone."

# Over 9 million people are

impacted by these locally-run projects as they run the race set before each of them. We serve them in their efforts by assisting in writing proposals, making donor reports, facilitating strategic planning sessions, doing debriefing and a wide range of training or consulting on the field together with them.



#### East Africa - Healing & Reconciliation for Sustainable Peace

and Development - "Before the reconciliation workshops were run, our community was completely divided with separate markets, churches and schools. No one dared cross the main road to do anything on the other side. Now our markets, schools and churches are integrated. Our children play together and we even care for one another's livestock."



#### **Kigali**, **Rwanda** - Reconciliation and Community

**Transformation** "I was crushed with guilt nearly my whole life. My Tutsi father pretended to be Hutu during the genocide, even killing Tutsi. I avoided these reconciliation workshops in my university because I feared my my guilt and shame would be known by everyone. But today I came and now I am free. I do not feel guilt anymore and I ask forgiveness from all those Tutsi my father wronged."



#### Asia - Integrated Rural Development (Micro-enterprise

projects) "When I first met this project, I was poor with a disabled husband and 3 children. I applied all I learned and am now am able to provide for my family and have become the vice-chairwoman of the Community Woman's Union and vice-chairwoman of my hamlet. I share my story and advise others how they too can overcome their difficulties."



### Southern Africa - Orphan & Community

**Empowerment:** "This 6-yr old orphan was bullied in school because he could not see. The \$1,500 operation to help him was completely out of our reach. As a whole community, young and old, we decided to donate whatever we had. Some gave as little as 20¢, others up to \$1, raising \$600! When the doctor heard, she was so impressed she performed the operation for only \$600. We learned that with God a community truly can take care of the needs of its members."

#### **Ethnic Reconciliation**

**181,219 people** refocused on the purpose of their race through healing, reconciliation and training from the team in Rwanda.

Reconciliation can be a dangerous business: "We nervously boarded the small MAF flight in South Sudan. At the last moment, the Archbishop (from the Dinka tribe) decided to come with us to experience "this thing everyone was highly commending." Having a Dinka leader with us was very dangerous as all Dinka are seen as murders and rapists where we were going. We landed to a huge welcome by a heavily-armed truck and delegation of church and government people but we chose to travel without any army personnel or guns. Instead, escorted by the local bishop, we walked to the venue on foot so we would not be attacked by the local militias because of the Dinka amongst us. At first, everyone was highly suspicious and it was difficult not to get caught up in politics. However, God honored our obedience and people confessed, forgave, left their anger at the cross and by the 3<sup>rd</sup> day, the desire to debate was completely gone. The last day all the tribal leaders walked through the city together for the first time. There is hope! The Archbishop was so excited, he chartered a plane to his home town without consulting
